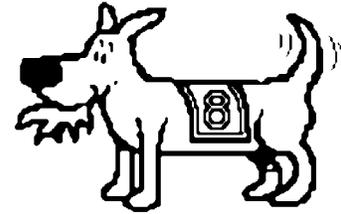

## Jerry's Corner

At the January meeting, I gave a demo on a data base program called Flex File. A couple of months later I was able to get several copies to sell at the club

meeting, at which time I promised that I would be around to help anyone that needed help with getting started with it. I'm not sure, but we might have one or two copies left in the public domain library. If not and you want one let me know and I will see if I can still get some.

If you have already bought a copy and want some help either getting it started or using it I plan on having a clinic at our June meeting. All you need is your copy of Flex File and two blank disks. I will bring my 128, 1541, 1571, & 1581 so that we can configure it to match most systems, and in that way we will be able to set it up to match yours when setting up Flex File.

Now a word about something that I have done and it worked out great. If you own a 128D you may or may not know that your computer has 64K of video ram (dram) as opposed to the fact that the 128 only comes with 16K of video ram. In most cases this will make no difference but

there are a few programs out there that make use of this extra memory. And if you are like me, it bugs you to know that your little buddy isn't all the he (she ?) can be! Fear not, there is a way that your 128 can have that 64K of ram also. Actually two ways: The first is to send off for a piggy back board that you install and it will only run you about \$40 to \$60. Or for about \$10 and 2 hours of work with a soldering iron you can put in 2 new sockets and chips that look and fit much better. If this is of interest to you, talk to Nate Dannenberg, Robert Bales or Jerold (Jerry) Shook (that's me :-> ) about what you will need and how to go about doing it. It is not difficult, but you will need to be able to use a soldering iron and take a little care in doing it. Also if you talk real nice, you probably will be able to get some help doing it.

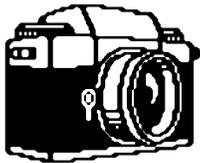
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## From the Personal Files

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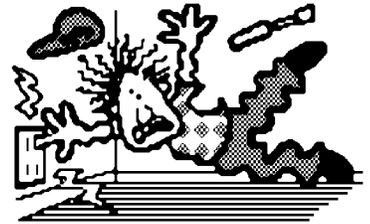
## A Commodore Success Story: Stan Baska

Is there a future for those who love to play with a Commodore computer? We have evidence that there is indeed a future. Stan Baska's story illustrates the point:

What would you do with a stack of twelve floppy disks that had been immersed in cooking oil? Stan's answer was to remove the covers, dry them with a soft cloth, and put them in new covers. He was actually able to save 90 per cent of the data stored on them.

At another time a man complained to him that 97 disks of his would work at Stan's house but not at his own home. After much testing and trying, Stan found that the trouble was in the wiring of the man's home. In some circuits, the ground and hot wire had been switched.

He feels a genuine pride of accomplishment when he restores an old drive to mint condition.

It was Stan who first got Jim Glenn started in repairing Commodore 64's for Midwest Computers. Jim caught on so quickly that he soon started repairing them in his own home.

But, you may ask, how does this provide a future? The answer lies in the reputation he has built up. He works for Sedgwick County in the mapping department but any time any computer in Wichita or Sedgwick county is in trouble, there is a good chance that a call will go out to Stan. He also suggests system configurations for various county and city applications. Stan's success story may well serve as an example for our club members who are well versed in the ways of computers.

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## Random Access

### Risk for the C64

I'm not big on computer games. I'm basically a word processing / telecommunications kind of guy. But there's something about **Risk**. Maybe its the flashbacks to those marathon Risk games back in my old college dorm. Can a computer game capture the essence of a classic board game without seeming too, ...well, ...mechanical? I am happy to say, yes it can!

**Risk** is a game of world domination. The winner is the player who vanquishes his opponents and occupies every territory on the world map. From three to six human and/or computer-controlled players may take part in a game. You can play **Risk** by yourself, but the computer must control at least one hostile and one neutral, or two hostile players. The programmers have done a good job providing all of popular variations of **Risk**.

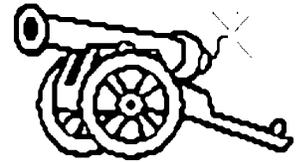
The world map matches the board game very well. Only about 1/4 of the world is visible at a time, making it easy to see which territories are adjacent to one another. As you move the cursor to the edges of the screen, the map scrolls to make additional territories visible. The territories change color to match that of the controlling player. Territory names and troop strengths are also shown on this map. During your turn, you can get a view of the entire world -- a summary, if you will, of who controls what. There is also an information menu that gives a textual summary of each player: territories & continents held, number of armies remaining, and number of **Risk** cards on hand.

All game commands are handled by a series of pull-down menus. The menus may be accessed using either a joystick or the keyboard. The computer takes care of rolling the "dice" and determining the outcome of each battle. The continuous attack option keeps the game moving by rolling the dice as long as the attacker wins or ties the battles. If the defender wins the battle, the attack stops giving the attacker a chance to rethink his strategy.

The manual that comes with the game is very good. It includes the rules for each variation of **Risk**, plus hints on strategy, as well as the details of loading and running the game. On the negative side, **Risk** takes quite long to load. There is some consolation in that the disk is not accessed again until the end of the game or unless a player chooses to look at the world summary map. In any case, the computer version of **Risk**, like its board game counterpart, can be a long-playing game.

My copy of **Risk** was accidentally packaged with an Apple II manual. The folks at Virgin Games mailed me the correct manual within a few days. In the meantime, I was able to muddle through and play a few games. I'm not sure if that success is due to my ability as a user or to the quality of the program.

In summary, I like computer **Risk** as much as I like the board game. Yes, the programmers did come up with a fine adaptation. I think that most fans of the board game will agree. "Hey, guys! You can cram for that Physics exam later! Let's go down to the lounge and play **Risk**..."

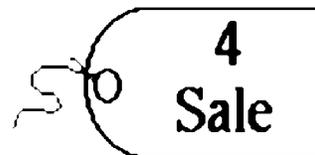

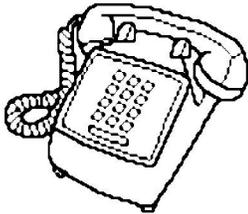

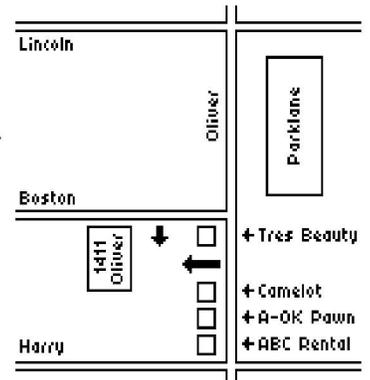
