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## *The Chief Sez*

This is an article I have dreaded writing for some time now but, alas, the time has come when all good things must end and so it is with the 8 bit Commodore line, Port Commodore, *The Reflection* and so on.

By the time you read this most of you will be aware that Port Commodore, supposedly the flagship of New Image, was sunk on 12/31/91. The reasons are many and varied and I'll detail some of them here. You will also note that this is the last issue of this newsletter. Now for the details.

For some time now I have been aware of the fact that the BBS world as a whole was suffering a slow down in activity and a lack of participation by the users. I have seen the activity on my board drop from 60 percent to about 40 percent (or less on many days), and seen the number of calls per day drop from 35-40 to under 10. The drops have been sudden, declining from 35 to 20 in one jump, then from 20 to 13 in the next jump and finally from 13 to 6 with the last jump. Couple

the decline with the fact that I'm spending over \$150.00 per month on long distance phone bills, virtually all of which is network related, and you see that it is a total waste of time for me to run a board that is simply not used.

It isn't just the decline in users. It is other factors as well. John is having a problem with his hard drive and his board is down as well. I don't know if/when it will come back up. With his board down there is a huge hole in the network, it is essentially cut in half, and I am unable to patch it. It is discouraging.

Further, I have about become convinced that the 2.0 version will not be completed. With John's board down and Ray not having the time to work on it it seems unlikely that it will be completed. I can't continue to run a partial system that people want but cannot get. That also entered into the equation.

And let's look at the newsletter. Everyone thought it was a great idea. Those that subscribed said it was great. Still, when it came time to re-new, few did. The most we ever had was about 110 subscribers. That number has diminished to the point where we now

have about 60 subscribers. In December we had 10 people who's subscription expired. We got ONE re-nwal. (To be fair, a couple others would have re-nwed but they waited too long and by the time they made up their minds I had decided to pull the plug.)

This newsletter has never been a money making proposition. I have lost money on virtually every issue. Part of that is my fault as I have sent out hundreds of free copies in the hopes that we'd pick up some subscribers. We did get some from the free issues, but not as many as I'd have liked. We also provided a service by offering BBS ads for \$1.00 per month and they have gone practically unused.

Does it sound like I'm bitter? I'm not really. I'm just rather depressed. There are hundreds of sysops out there that think that IMAGE is the greatest BBS program in the world (and I agree), and they think that the support is the best of any BBS program, yet they fail to take advantage of the support that is available to them.

I will continue to answer the voice support line, at least temporarily. I will also offer what help I can on Q-link to those few that are still active there. I may set my board back up with a 1.2 system (that which remains available) rather than the 2.0 which is not available. I will also call the local IMAGE board, The Prince's Palace (801-375-2646) so if anyone needs to get in touch with me via BBS. Also, BUCKO will be forming a new network, the NISSA network to replace the IMAGE network which

will probably fold up.

And finally, anyone that has time left on your subscription will receive a refund. It may take a couple of months to get them all out but, rest assured, you will get a refund.

Thanks to all of you for supporting this newsletter. It has been a lot of fun and I have really enjoyed doing it.

### Renumbering with your Lt. Kernal

My topic this time around is Renumbering with the Lt. Kernal.

First you need a file to renumber. Let's try this

```
1 iftr%< 1then1812
2 a$="s.welcome 1":dr=1:
gosub1075
3 &"[F6][F6]View It Again? ":
gosub1902:ifathen1
4 goto1812
999 rem
```

Okay now let's say we want to renumber it for whatever reason. First we decide on the parameters. We'll make it renumber lines 2-3 in increments of 10. Now type

```
renum 10,10,2-999[RETURN]
```

```
[inc],[new start #],[old start-
old end]
```

8-39}

The Lt. Kernal will respond with unknown line in 00001

And will display the line in question.

Cursor down 2 or 3 lines and type  
1812 rem delete[RETURN]

Then cursor back up to the RENUM command and just hit RETURN. It will give you the same response until all the lines have been accounted for.

Cursor down to your line 1812 and type the next problem line number over the old one. Keep doing this until you no longer get an unknown line response.

If you can't find the problem line in all the gibberish Cursor up to where the gibberish is and SPACE over it. If you've re-typed every line number in the problem line and you still get unknown line and it's not the address a LMP (801,901, etc.) THEN you have a problem and need to start debugging.

When you are satisfied hit s plus a filename and RETURN. List the program and delete ALL lines that read rem delete.

Finally hit s again to update the file. You're done! Now fire up the system and give it a test. If you have problems try again and be sure you've deleted the rem deletes.

## Programming Workshop

I had hoped to do a lot more with this column but, in the interest of time I suppose all we can do is wrap it up and leave it up to someone else to add the finishing touches.

So far we have created a short file that can be called by an auto maintenance routine that will open the user file and select one user. It will then award that user an amount of credit as generated by a random generator. Pretty simple. I'd call it "+.genie" and use it that way.

What I'd hoped to do with it in future issues was to add a routine to send mail to the user, possibly a news file routine, possibly alter it so that it would pick a winner even if it came up with a RES or deleted account (just send it back and have it generate another random user number until it found a good one).

I'm sure that most of you know that to add it to the automaintenance sequence it is only necessary to find the file that calls "+.lo" now, it will have a line that looks like this:

```
xxx f1=3:a$="lo":goyo1016
```

It would just be necessary to change that to read:

```
xxx a$="genie":goto1016
```

And then change line 1 of the file "+.genie" to read:

```
1 gosub801:f1=3:a$="lo":goto1016
```

Of course if you're using the LMP automaintenance it would be different, it would be called with a gosub to 801 and line 1 of the file would be deleted.

## S.C.U.G.

S.C.U.G. (Which stands for Suburban Commodore Users' Group) Was a club started in 1985 initiated by a group of people who got together and decided to create a user group to exchange ideas and programs for the Commodore 64 & C128.

The club evolved into a monthly get-together club with a President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary. After about four years the club went from having a monthly meeting to having two meetings a year. Activity was low and not until recently has the activity picked up.

The club had a BBS to check into and leave messages to each other and a quick program exchange (Which, in 1985, ran on a C64, Green Monitor, a 1541, and one SFD-1001 w/BUSCARD interface.)

The BBS ran C-Net 10.0 soft-

ware by Perspective. Not until late '88 or early '89 did SCUG inherit a copy of IMAGE 1.0 from a BBS going Amiga. The SysOp there helped install it and was there until one in the morning helping set it up.

In '90 SCUG finally got its copy of V1.2. (At the time SCUG was running low on space, two 1581 drives and one 1541.) IMAGE 1.2 was an ABSOLUTE DREAM. Sure the SysOps saw previews from other BBS's but this belonged to SCUG ALONE! Then about December of '90 SCUG got it's first 20 meg Lt. Kernal HD. It ran so much faster!

After running about 5-6 months a benevolent user (who wishes to remain ANONYMOUS) gave SCUG an 85 meg SEAGATE ST-296N drive. That really helped!

After about 3 more months SCUG got a 210 Meg drive but because of the current DOS version's capabilities it can only go to the OPTIMUM space of 152.9 meg. This brings us to present day SCUG which supports ANY Computer's up/downloads.

Hopefully by late December or early January SCUG will go the full 210 meg to expand for even more space! Call us and see all of the great mods!
