

<u>ာ Austten's Special Tricks And Tips's.</u>

As you are probably aware your Commodore 64 has 88k of memory. When you turn it on however you find that only 38911 bytes are free. Where then are the rest? For C128 owners the figures are 192k of memory of which 122365 bytes are free. Where then goes the mest?

The rest of the memory is taken up by such things as the Operating System (OS), the Kernal, the Standard Character Set, BASIC and other needs of the computer as well as free memory that is not available from BASIC.

This article and the ones in the following months will help you to get more from your computer.

Many of the Tricks and Tips will involve POKEING to areas of your computers memory. This is simple to do. While your computer is waiting for you to do something (It has a READY prompt and a flashing cursor) type this in (C64 or C: in 64 mode only)

POKE 53280,1 (And then press RETURN)

The border changed color, this is no marvellous feat but it gives us an idea of what we can do. Well what DID we do?

All of the seperate locations inside your computer have a number starting at 0 and progressing up. The location 53280 controls the border color. This means that what-ever number is in here will be the border color. What we did was to POKE the number 1 in this location. Now try POKING different numbers to this location. First hint is that the highest number you can put in here is 255.

Here are some more for you to try with a bigger list to come next month.

POKE650,128 POKE808,251 POKE56325,10

POKE646,1

All the keys will repeat. Disable Run/Stop key. Changes cursor speed, (Experement on this one.) Changes character color, (Play with this one also).

Now that you have got some idea of the basics next month we will go a bit deeper with more specialised POKES for you to try, and we will find out about two-byte numbers... All for now, SYS64738

Have you tried that one? FORSALE.
