I just got off the phone with Dave, and got an update on Holly, CO.

Dave and family are doing fine, they are camped out nicely in their 5th wheel in the driveway of their home. They are in the process of moving belongings from the home to storage containers in the front. He thinks that the house should be able to be salvaged. His is the only one standing on his side of the block.

The tornado, which was well under the radar, touched down just outside of town. (600 foot wide, moving at 1 mile a min.) So there wasn't much warning at all. Dave was teaching a bible study across town, but his wife was at home. She said that the front windows blew out first, then the rear windows. By the time she got to the basement steps, (stepping over the glass and mess) it was over.

There was one fatality, three seniors are still in the hospital. Dave said that this has really pulled this town closer together as neighbors are helping neighbors, lines of race are also being crossed. For the first time, a translator was at the town meeting.

Loadstar will be late this month... Dave tells me that all of his gear survived nicely. He is looking forward to attending the Vintage show in New Jersey, and \*might\* show for CCCC, as there might not be much that can be done for a little while. Red Cross and many, many volunteers have been on site, and as stated before most of the major cleanup has been handled. (Chain saws were fired up at 6:00am the next morning)

## Cross-platform Tool GoatTracker 2.6 Released

GoatTracker V2.6 changes screen resolution of all versions (normal, distortion, stereo) to 800x600. This means more visible musicdata at once. Screen output routines were also optimized for slower machines. Now also all filter commands should work equally on both sides in the stereo version :)

I had some time to play with the new version, and I have to say I like it. The whole user interface seems to be quicker. However, I never did figure out how to use the distortion hack in the distortion version.

All in all, GoatTracker really makes composing music for the Commodore 64 and 128 quite a bit simpler than the traditional music editors that use note durations instead of the Protracker style interface.

## New Book About the Commodore 64 is Being Produced

A new book about the Commodore 64 is in the works!

From the website, <http://c64goldenyears.com> :

"In 1982, the Commodore computer company launched its new machine - the Commodore 64. Twenty five years later, that machine is still going strong with new games and thousands of users worldwide. To tell the story of the best-selling home computer of the 1980's, writer and Commodore 64 fan Andrew Fisher looks back at around two hundred of the top games and how the industry has changed. From the pioneering third party companies like Electronic Arts and Melbourne House, to the homebrew software of the new millennium, the story of an 8-bit computer (and its remarkable sound chip) is a nostalgia trip for games fans.

This is the next book in the GOLDEN YEARS series."

Q: How many pages will the book have?

A: 254 pages, a similar size and format to Andrew Rollings' Spectrum book. It will be full colour throughout. There will be an introduction, a contents list and then chapters for each year starting with 1982.

Towards the end of the C64's commercial life, there is one chapter dealing with 1993-1994, and a final chapter looking at 1995 to the present day. Each chapter opens with an historical look-back at the computer industry of the time and what was happening with the C64. Each review then has screenshots, a scan of the cover artwork and the review itself. This is split into three main sections - a review of what I think of the game, trivia about the game or its creators, and finally a synopsis of the story and how it plays.

Q: I'd like to see "Game X" in the book - will you include it?

A: There will be a definitive list of games on the site as soon as it is finalized (see question 8), but feel free to make suggestions via the contact page. In the case of sequels and long-running series, there will be references to them in an entry for part of that series (e.g. Last Ninja Remix is discussed under the entry for Last Ninja 2).

Q: Will it be all arcade games, or will there be games that require a lot of thought?

A: There's a good cross-section of styles - from platformers to driving games, text adventures to board games, role-playing games to shoot 'em ups.

Q: How were the games chosen?

A: A combination of methods was used to whittle down the list. First of all, top game lists from sites like Gamebase64 and Lemon64 were combed through. Secondly, many of the titles are games I played and remember fondly for various reasons. There are also a few obscure titles and several that have a historic significance. The final list was then sorted by copyright date and alphabetical order, and organised into chapters for the book.

Q: How were the screenshots taken?

A: It would be impractical to organise screen photography, so PC emulators like Vice and CCS were used to capture the screenshots. The palettes used are designed to give a "bright" image on the page.

After browsing the Spectrum book (snapshots below), this sounds quite promising. I can't wait to see it in production.
