Why were Ryman chosen? Horne says: "We chose Ryman for their innovative entrepreneurial management and business reputation.

"Also it is a natural supply line in small and medium businesses." Since the installation of two test sites this spring, SoftShop has proved to be a successful concept.

Funded by, among others, 3i Investors in Industry – the world's largest venture capital company, Horne expects to make profits in excess of £600,000 in the first year.

SoftShop has a strategy of low fixed cost structure. There are no overheads situated as the shops are within Ryman – SoftShop pays Ryman a percentage of each sale. This is an agreement which is said to suit both companies well.

Another advantage for Soft-Shop is the strong support being received by the software houses themselves.

Accounting for this initial success, Horne says: "We supply the user with what he wants. We can offer eight-hour on-site servicing, on-line leasing, and try and buy software.

"Customers can buy demonstration software and if they are happy with the product they get their money back — 60% do buy.

"We plug, install and test software for the customer and only leave when it is up and running."

You Can't Knock It

Unlike a standard hard disk subsystem the BORSU 10+ drives are virtually indestructible. Visitors to the BORSU stand at a recent trade show were amazed to see disk cartridges hurled to the floor and the drive itself thumped, bumped and even turned upsidedown during a read write operation! In terms of the maintenance of data integrity these acts of apparent vandalism went totally unnoticed by disks and drives alike.

Safety First is the Key

With storage density of 24,000 bits per inch the BORSU 10+drives need a fairly extensive error correction scheme, and the designers have responded to this need - with a vengeance. Although each of the 306 tracks actually contain 70 sectors, only 64 are released to the user. Of the remaining 6 sectors one provides a 4096 bit parity check for the rest of the track. The other five sectors act as substitutes should any of the regular sectors become unusable.

There are also an extra 4 tracks on each disk which can be brought into use if an entire tract should prove defective. Now that's what I call data protection!



Caxton announce new software

Caxton Software Ltd has recently announced some new pieces of software which will run on the Commodore PC.

The first is 'Memory Shift'. This is designed to allow you to load different programs into different areas in memory and allow them to transfer data from one to the other. It can handle up to nine programs at once, as long as there is sufficient memory and in theory sounds extremely useful.

The second program is called 'Smart Path'. The real problem with programs originally converted to MSDOS is that they use overlay files, meaning that all the files must be in the correct directory or the program will crash or require much director swapping. What Smart Path does is to use the resident



>PATH< command to make these overlay files search through all the directories, hence saving time.

Memory Shift is under £150

and Smart Path is under £60.

IBM 'deny' mythical new PC

Last month's unheard of statement from IBM denying that they were planning to release a new PC (nicknamed unexcitingly the PC-2) has done very little to slow the gossip.

Seen by most in the industry as no more than an attempt to revive the dwindling market in IBM PC's, even IBM have not managed to convince people that the now four-year-old PC is not in for an update shortly, especially with the problems caused by the PC-AT.

Telewriter to be available for Commodore PC's

Kyle-Price and Whitehead, a Guernsey-based software group is at the moment converting its well reviewed TeleWriter for the Commodore and other PC compatibles.

Designed to be a first, Tele-Writer is an on-line word processor. What it does especially well is to allow you to create a neat and well written document and then transmit it.

It also turns your computer into a terminal capable of communicating with other computers, either down the phone, using an acoustic coupler or modem, or directly using the RS232 port.

Perhaps the best function is that it allows you to load letters which were waiting for you on Telecom Gold into TeleWriter, and then edit them and print them to your satisfaction.

Although not priced yet, Tele-Writer is likely to be good value for money, and we will be reviewing it in more detail in the next Business Magazine.

From PET to PC

Using 3D's interface, it is possible to transfer data files from your old PET to Commodore's new PCs

D Digital Design & Development was initially approached for custom-built interfaces such as IEEE-488 analog to digital and digital to analog convertors and relay control units for the early Commodore computers.

It comes as little surprise, perhaps, that 3D are keeping pace with Commodore's product advances in making available an interface which allows one to transfer data from a PET to a PC.

The existence of data built up on your business' computer over the years plays not an insignificant role in the decision to upgrade to a newer incompatible machine. If you are a PET user, 3D's interface allows you to upgrade with ease.

It looks likely tht the interface will allow conversion of not only basic data, but preformatted word processing and spreadsheet data. This could prove invaluable to businesses that store forecasts on their current PET and are not willing to sacrifice previous work purely for upgrade purposes.

Available at £220 plus VAT, 3D's IEEE-RS232C interface enables you to transfer files from 8032/8296 to the Commodore PC or any other IBM compati-

bles and vice versa. Features include:

A 2K buffer which leaves one computer free whilst the other can be carrying on with something else.

DTR, CTS plus X-on/X-off.

A very useful function is the programmable baud rate which allows you to choose speeds varying from 50 to 19200 cpa. It also formats data and successfully converts code.

Bessey Speaks Out On

In the words of general manager Nick Bessey, "The awareness of Commodore as a business supplier has been limited". Here he tells CCI how he intends to reinstate Commodore in the business market

Business

"

e started the business system market, perhaps with the help of Apple," says Bessey.

"The gap in our business systems strategy has been a product gap in 1983/84, during which time IBM took a dominant position.

"With the launch of the PC10 and 20, and the emergence of the Amiga, the situation is changing."

Joining Commodore after 12 years with IBM, Bessey is well-suited to head Commodore's attack on the business front.

"It is a very competitive market," says Bessey. "I recognise the size of that challenge."

One of his first tasks on joining the company was to establish a strong team of professionals with business expertise.

Bessey says: "I now have a team of 20 people, all with a strong PC business background. That has built up the level of expertise here at Corby."

An advertising promotion was also undertaken to increase awareness in the business sector. Commodore placed

"Good product, good prices and good distribution"

adverts in the national press emphasising price and performance of the PC's. Bessey says: "The promotion we did was expressly a short term way of advertising the Commodore image. It was not strongly response based. Though we did receive thousands of enquiries."

Commodore is quickly building up an efficient dealer network taking into consideration geographical location and quality dealership.

In addition to wanting only the best dealers, Commodore is also concerned with making the dealers comfortable with Commodore.

"We are offering the dealers a good product, good prices and unique distribution," says Bessey.

Commodore is also assisting its PC distributors in promoting awareness for the PC10 and 20.

"All the distributors have had the opportunity to hold open days," says Bessey. "Our distributor in Ireland, Tomorrow's



World, have run television advertising. Most of these marketing activities have been funded by Commodore."

In the UK there is a strategy towards Commodore Business Centres. The difference is that Commodore dealers buy from distributors, whereas business centres buy direct from Commodore. There are 45 Commodore Business Centres in the UK at present.

The machine that will steal the limelight at the beginning of 1986 is the much-talked about Amiga.

Bessey says: "The really big driving force behind the Amiga is its ability to do what can't already be done on PCs.

The Amiga is set for a January launch.

"When I arrived at Commodore in April, the plan was to announce the Amiga in February," says Bessey. "I could announce it this November, but it is not a good time of the year to come out with a new product."

"Amiga will get approval based on MSDOS compatability"

Another advantage in waiting until January is that a large range of Amiga softwware will be available.

"The Amiga will get approval based on MSDOS compatability," says Bessey. "The pre-requisites being compatability with other MSDOS PCs.

"Why Amiga MSDOS," he continues. "There will be a lot of attractive business software using this approach with the advantage of compatability."

Bessey says that a number of software houses in the UK are preparing unique Amiga product.

"Having software developed by outside companies is the only way to guarantee sufficient quantity of software," says Bessey.

"We have deals with a large number of software houses and we are in uniquely good shape to ensure quality control," he continues.

"We get involved in terms of reference, and more importantly we are involved in the product. On top of that we have 30 people who evaluate software products."

Developing software on the Amiga is a comprehensive process and Commodore are contacted almost on a daily basis.

Bessey says: "By January we expect to have quite a number of entirely new software offerings taken from the US and also developed by UK software houses."

Commodore is demonstrating its faith in

the Amiga with Bessey's claim that it will take 20% of the business market sector.

He says: "If we take the 1986/87 financial year starting July 1986, this is the year we expect to have 20% of the market."

Enquiries as to what machines we can expect from Commodore in the future are met by an exasperated look from Bessey.

He says: "We will have released the PC10 and 20 and the Amiga within twelve months and we have built a strong team with expertise in business marketing.

"Also we will have established a strong dealer network and will set a standard in service to the dealer – that's enough for the first twelve months!"

PCs On The Move

66 As we have never stocked PCs before, we didn't really know what to expect. We have been a little disappointed. There are so many compatibles on the market that competition is fierce.

From the response point of view people are very impressed. We ran a software compatibility challenge to find software that wouldn't run on the PC. Nobody could find anything.

For us it isn't a good time to launch a product, but people who have seen it will definitely come back to it later.

At an open day we had a lot of interest and sold eight. If Commodore's name was banded around more it would help. 99



We are offering financing for hardware and software over a period of time, therefore spreading the cost and paying on a monthly basis. This is generally over three years, although we would consider up to five years.

Communications: getting the message through There is more to computers than data-processing and

There is more to computers than data-processing and number-crunching. We tell you how to benefit in the expanding computer world of communications

Today's business buzz-word in the information technology sector must be communications. Tired of using their computers purely for data processing and number crunching. Businessmen are seeing real possibilities in the ever expanding world of modems, baud rates and downloading.

Commodore's PC, and all other MSDOS machines are well provided for when it comes to modems, and, as with almost anything in the computer market, you can pay as much or as little as you want.

The minimum requirements to get your-self 'on-line' are as follows:—

A 300/300 baud modem or acoustic coupler.

A R\$232 (or similar) port and cable. Some communications software. A telephone or jack socket.

Modems for PCs

As I said, these are all minimums with which you can access almost all the important on-line mainframes or Bulletin Boards. To get the most from your computer and to save time, an auto-dial modem would be a justifiable extra. The two most commonly used baud rates are 1200 receive/75 transmit and 300/300. Both these transmit speeds are reliable and do not try to get too much out of the phone line. Therefore you are unlikely to lose large amounts of data through line noise.

In my view a modem is far more preferable to an acoustic modem, unless you will be using a portable computer and therefore need something truly transportable. One modem which seems to be popular amongst PC users is Tandata's Tm512, a high quality modem with autodial and answer and a variety of software packages available to match your needs. (I will be writing a full review of this product in the next Business Magazine.)

The two most popular reasons for pur-

chasing a modem are Prestel and Telecom Gold. Both of these are inexpensive ways of accessing large amounts of general data such as, in Prestel's case, flight arrival times, weather forecasts and entertainments guides. Although these are useful facilities they are not ones which show the enormous capabilities of the computerphone link. One thing Prestel is very good for, however, is learning the format of general Bulletin Boards and outside databases. Operating almost throughout on menus, they are simple but the more you practice the more time is saved when logging on purely to find one piece of information.

Mailbox Services

Telecom Gold has developed in a different direction to Prestel, and has become widely known as the biggest Mailbox service in England, and being truly international it is just as simple to send a message from Melbourne to Edinburgh as it is to send one from north to south London.

For anyone who has never used a mailbox system before, what it basically does is store any messages in a mainframe wherever the link is, and when the person to whom you sent the message to logs on, it is displayed on his screen and he is free to read it at his leisure.

This may sound no different from the system on which Telex is based, but the messages are more personal (and the spellings better!) and for the security minded amongst us this is an important consideration.

There are other Mailbox bases available, such as Istel and One-to-One, both of which operate in a similar fashion. The best thing to do is examine each and see which suits you best. For companies, the most practical is to set up their own, thus saving money on charges and being able to have it designed to personal specifications.

Information retrieval

Perhaps the most useful on-line facility apart from Mailbox is information retrieval. Using bases such as Datasolve you can access almost any information on anything you want. One such example of this is the 'World Reporter'. What this does is allows you to search through the files to read articles from any of the papers and magazines it has stored in memory. Taking 'World Reporter' as an example, it has thousands of articles stored from journals such as the Financial Times, the Guardian, the Washington Post, Associated Press and many others.

To read a specific article you just tell it to search for a specific word and it will then display all the articles with that word in, as a list, you can then narrow the list down with a more specific word, and so on until you find the relevant article. Having found the article you can then either download it into your computer or, more practically, dump it to their lazer printer. They will then post it that day and, post willing, you will recieve it in the morning.


Not an executive toy!

Facilities like these however do not come cheap, and at £1.00 per minute it is unlikely to be justifiable as an executive toy!

The last item of real interest I am going to talk about is British Telecom's PSS (Packet SwitchStream). The real advantage of this is that computers running at different speeds can communicate, as all the data is sent in 'Packets' rather than true transmission.

If you are interested in this subject as a consumer, I would recommend reading the 'Communications Management Yearbook 1985' published by EMAP at £34.95. Although expensive it is both interesting and technically accurate, and we will be reviewing it soon.

ard on the heels of the PC10, Commodore has taken another step to re-establish itself as a leader of the business market by introducing a hard disk version, the PC20.

As we noted in our first impressions (see Commodore Business Magazine July 1985), the PC20 is an IBM XT clone aimed at the business user with a substantial amount of data to control.

Outwardly, the only difference between the PC20 and the 10 is the former's blanking panel where the lower drive aperture appears on the PC10. Inside it has one 360 KB floppy drive and a 10MB Winchester disk. (for other specifications see box).

The PC20 is undoubtedly agreeably designed with an attractive cream and grey colour scheme. It gives a well engineered feel and is clearly built to last. It would add to the decoration as well as the efficiency of any office.

The instructions are clear and simple to follow; the setting up is easy and going through the prompts for date and time quick and smooth.

The monitor impressed us greatly. Is it the highest quality screen around? We certainly felt that its crisp green lettering was the best we have viewed. Eye comfort is an important point with the likelihood of someone, possibly you, spending long hours staring at it.

Nearly all the remarks we made on the PC10 equally apply to the PC20. Of course the hard disk version gives greatly superior storage capacity.


The only thing you have to do is partition the disk. When we first ran the PC20, we did not have the manual (are engineers faster than writers?). Commodore was very helpful to us; the level of useful support was high. No doubt as a user, your dealer would supply this function – all the more reason for considering Commodore PC's as the dealer network has been carefully checked out.

Commodore is promising a 14-inch medium resolution RCB colour monitor to be sold with Commodore's own colour control. At the present you can use a colour card and one of the IBM compatible colour monitors (around £450). The PC20 keyboard is well laid out and has useful illuminated caps and numeric lock keys, allowing full use of the business designed numeric keypad. All the keys are sculptured and have a very positive and agreeable feel to them. Very pleasant to use.


Conclusion


The PC20 does not claim to be at the leading edge of technology. But for buyers that is often called 'the bleeding edge' and best to be avoided. It has what is probably more important – the national support and international reputation of Commodore behind it. And it also has the vital reassurance that it is fully IBM compatible at the hardware and software levels. **Overall, we**

were very impressed. Every aspect of the machine is business-like and sensible. There is little to complain of and at the economical price (£2795.00 plus VAT), it offers excellent value, above all for the smaller business or professional organization. We would recommend before you buy a PC you speak to a Commodore dealer and check it out yourself.





Business Packages-PEGASUS

We chose to test out the Pegasus packages on the PC 20 because they are some of the most widely bought by PC users and they offer a range very suitable to the smaller business environment. They are Sales Ledger; Purchase Ledger; Nominal Ledger; Sales Invoicing; Job Costing; Stock; Bill of Materials and Payroll. This test covers Sales Ledger and Sales Invoicing (see subsequent issues of Commodore Business Magazine for the other packages).

When buying Pegasus packages – and this applies to much other business software too – you should realise that it is not just a 'get it, shove it in and off you go' situation. You almost certainly will need advice, help and guidance from your dealer, accountant or some other reliable

Two points: first, it contains a generous sprinkling of useful illustrations — which you will actually see on the screen and second, the helpful use of highlighting in the text of matters that require decision or action. For example "set this option to 'yes'," followed by an explanation of the consequences of the action. Very useful.

The same format is followed throughout the manual's various sections. Two small caveats: it would be useful, where packages need to be integrated, for there to be a table which set out the available options in each of the packages, to allow you to appreciate the total system before ever putting fingers on the keyboard; and what is lacking is a pre-printed form for the recording of responses to questions in the respective parameter files, (we wrote our notes down the margins of the manual. Very untidy, we admit).

The whole system is menu-driven with a number of levels.

- 1. Main Application
- 2. Individual Aspects
- 3. Taking you to the individual program.

This is important because mistakes can be very costly. Failing to understand the system could well lead you into problems at a later stage. For example, understanding the 'code' in the Sales Ledger with regard to discounting in the Sales Invoicing. There are, indeed, a number of areas where you can save yourself the time and inconvenience of having to go back and do something over if you ensure you understand the system well before putting it into full use.

What You Get

THE MANUAL. The Manual is a solid attractively presented document, divided into self contained sections for each of the packages.

It was all very quick and easy to operate. Information appears at both top and bottom of the screen telling you where you are and what you need to do.

Sales Ledger

The information you need to tell the Sales Ledger for each customer is a maximum four character code, name and address, credit limit, 2 digit analysis code (salesman territory etc). and open item or balance forward system (ask your accountant if you don't know what that is!) Three points to note:

- There is an 18 character comment box (for customer personal details, contact person etc.). We should like to have seen contact name and phone number as separate items.
- Name and address is really statement name and address. There is no apparent facility for a different invoice address (for branch accounting).
- 3. The prompts are boxed, very clearly presented and easy to move around.

By the way, the Sales Ledger has an interestingly sophisticated analysis code structure which incorporates the 2 digit code in the customer name and address set up plus an additional 4 character code for identifying individual transactions. The



system therefore allows you to generate a very wide variety of reports.

Standard information you can obtain:

- 1. Statements
- 2. Agent Debtor's List
- 3. List of Accounts
- 4. Total Outstanding Debtors
- 5. Four Analysis Reports (3 of these incorporate the 6 character analysis coding mentioned above, tailored to your own requirements; the fourth being V.A.T.)
- 6. Three Debtors Overdue Letters.

In addition, it also allows use of a report generator to produce ad hoc information.


Invoicing and Sales Order Processing

This follows exactly your normal procedure of receiving order, logging it in, processing it and (hopefully) getting paid.

The system allows the Sales Order Processing to integrate with the Stock (not subject of this review).

The Sales Order requires Account Number, Date, Order Number Due Date, Product, Quantity and Price.

Order acknowledgements can then be prepared and reports obtained of outstanding orders, including completed and cancelled orders. The invoices will then be produced automatically if the sales order processing has been properly integrated with the stock and invoicing applications. Ours were produced by going into the invoicing. However you might not want to do it that way particularly if you have any stock control requirements. The invoicing sub-menu allows for production not just of invoices but also of credit notes, proformas and quotations. In addition there is



the usual invoice information (including delivery address, which may differ from customer name and address). There is also a two line (75 characters each) space for comment.

The invoices - sales orders, though obtainable directly from the Pegasus stationery subsidiary are in a standard format. But, if you wish, you can within the program generate these to fit your own requirements. You may, however, need some help from your dealer or adviser to do

Conclusion

Pegasus - or at least the software tested here - is clearly a very good and highly useful business package.

What we particularly liked about it was that the setting up of the system is relatively easy for the vast majority of user applications. The ease of use is increased by a manual that is genuinely informative as to the real meaning of the options available. It is to coin a cliche, truly user-friendly. The system is well laid out, thoughtfully constructed and aesthetically pleasing. It is very satisfying to use and master.

All in all, we thought Pegasus a very comfortable tool to assist the small or medium size business to fulfill its needs with the minimum of difficulty and the maximum of efficiency.

There is no recommended retail price, but you would normally expect to pay between £275 and £400 per module, depending on the level of training and support given you by the dealer.



Learning the business, omputers need understanding to the greatest profit. The complexity of business packages means that experience are best availed by some

As with any other aspect of business, computers need understanding to yield the greatest profit. The complexity of many business packages means that expensive mistakes are best avoided by some form of training — although choosing the exact form of that training may well prove confusing.

How much training do you need? Who is the best source and who, in your organisation, needs to be trained, are just a few of the questions you may need to answer.

Computer Based Training

Today, there is a growing use of Computer Based Training (C.B.T.), which means that you may not even have to leave your office, or to have anyone else involved – in effect training yourself with the aid of your own computer.

There are, of course, a number of training establishments that offer help. Dealers nearly always provide aid to learning, which may be linked to a specific machine. Most good dealers will also train you to use the business software packages you need, and the business packages are, after all, your reason for wanting a computer.


When computers play an important role in your business, the last thing you want are expensive mistakes caused by the complexity of some business packages. We offer some guidelines to computer training.

There are other sources such as WH Smith's new Business Computer Centres which offer economical one day introductions to microcomputers. There is also an increasing number of Micro-systems Centres for Consultancy and Training. These are a part of the Micro Centre Federation (061-228 6333), which is connected to an official body — the National Centre for Information Technology. There is no official validating of courses, or officially accepted standards, but you can obtain from them a directory of training courses (£25 per copy).

Annual Directory

There are plans to set up an Information Technology Training Accreditation Council, which is to publish an annual directory of training companies who reach required standards.

The directory is largely aimed at the growing number of foreign students coming to the UK to study computing. Indeed, one of the phrases to note in any prospectus of a training establishment is 'students should have a reasonable fluency in English'. This probably means that the major-



of

ity of students attending the course are from abroad and the establishment's standards may not be as high as if they were dealing with local business trainees.

Computing grants

An interesting and little known fact is that there are for businesses employing under 500 people still computing grants available from the Department of Trade and Industry, via the Business and Technical Advisory Service. This is administered by PERA (0664-501501), or in the northwest UK by Salford University Industrial Centre (061-736 8931). They will consider any kind of computer application up to £5,000 – 15 days of consultancy; The first two days free and 75% of counselling fees for the other 13 days.

The Computing Services Association (01-405 2171) – an independent body can also be helpful. It will inform its 240 member companies of your interest through its free Commercial Enquiry Service.

MicroTutor

The ASI MicroTutor range of interactive software provides a complete library of Computer-based Training programmes for the IBM PC and compatible micro-computers.

Using a "split-screen" approach, an application package such as Lotus 1-2-3 or WordStar is displayed on the top half of the screen and the tutorial on the lower half. The program then takes the user through the software in easy to follow steps providing effective training on all aspects of the system.

The main benefits of MicroTutor are:-

- 1) The package is a complete training course.
- 2) The 'modular' design allows the user to choose one particular part of the program to be cleared.
- An emphasis is placed on userparticipation to ensure full understanding and increase the level of interest.
- 4) Also, the tutorial program can be used by any number of users, hence reducing the cost of training.


We tried out the Lotus 1-2-3 course and found it very easy to use and highly recommendable.

Visual training

There is also an interesting number of developments in the video cassette field. These are a clear way of presenting individual machines, application packages or even programming languages.

There are, of course, manuals and books. The size and complexity of these (we recently came across a 535 page manual!) are very often a natural cause for alarm for any busy and still rational manager.

For anyone as full occupied as most managers of small businesses, CBT is probably the most useful answer. A growing number of companies supply relatively cheap packages — disks or other simple to use aids. We will be covering this increasingly important aspect of training (see box) as a subject in its own right in subsequent issues of Commodore Business Magazine.

Operating the Amiga

Commodore's forthcoming Amiga has created a great deal of interest. In our next business magazine we will be covering it extensively; to whet your appetite Francis Jago introduces the Amiga and its disk-operating system produced by Metacomco.

I t must have come as quite a shock to many leading software houses in America when it was announced that Metacomco had been given the contract to produce the Disk operating system for the long awaited Amiga.

To Metacomco it must have seemed like a dream come true. It started when they were asked by Commodore to produce an Assembler for the Amiga, which they did. Having completed it to Commodore's satisfaction they were then asked — completely out of the blue — to create a back-up operating system within four weeks. Luckily for them, Metacomco already had a tried and trusted O.S, Tripos. Although also 68000-based, Tripos had to be considerably altered to make it suitable for use on a machine such as the Amiga.


When the original operating system failed to be completed on time, Metacomco were in the perfect situation to step in and grab the contract.

Tripos was originally developed in 1976 at Cambridge University, from where it went with different people to Bath University and also stayed at Cambridge. Tim King, the research and development director of Metacomco, took Tripos to Bath and developed it as a Multi-tasking 68000 operating system of great potential.

Having produced the D.O.S., Metacomco were then approached to produce a Basic to run on the Amiga. Never ones to turn down an offer like that, Metacomco produced A-Basic.

"An operating system of great potential"

The Amiga uses windows and mouse-accepting Icons to use the computer without bothering with the complications of a Command Line interface. The pull down windows are extremely smooth and fast, and the brilliance of multi-tasking allows you to have different jobs taking place in different windows. A very good demonstration of this was when three differing graphical programs were run in



three windows whilst you could still be using the computer for something else, without an enormous speed decrease.

A-Basic is very comprehensively covered for instructions and it can be used to run programs fast enough to please all Basic programmers who have no desire to learn 68000 machine language. This is well shown in our two screen shots, both of which were produced using a short and uncomplicated Basic program.

As a computer, the Amiga has created a huge amount of public interest and from what I have seen this is totally justified. It runs at 8 mhz, and has graphical capabilities superior to that of any home/business

machine I have ever seen (Pluto boards included). Fortunately, unlike some rather more famous mouse driven machines, the actual operating system and Basic does not let it down. The Basic can also handle true multi-tasking, allowing you to run two separate basic programs at once, although as yet two programs cannot share the same code whilst running independently.

The Basic graphics commands are amazingly comprehensive for such a high level language, and this only serves to heighten the endless possibilities for the competent programmer using A-Basic. As well as superb graphics, the Amiga has not been let down in the sound department. With stereo sound, MIDI interface and built in speech synthesis it achieves some outstanding effects using uncomplicated com-

mands such as TRANSLATE and NA-RRATE which, when used in conjunction with each other, create clear and well defined English using the well established Phoneme method. One totally amazing feature of the Amiga's sound capabilities is

its Fairlight CMI data compatability. This means a relatively non-expensive home computer can manipulate the data from a 28,000 synthesiser.

Although all the DOS commands are accessed off disk at present, this presents no real problems as the disk is fast, and you can always do something else whilst you wait!




Overall, Metacomco must be congratulated for persevering and putting all the hard work necessary to secure a contract of this importance. The product they have come up with is certainly of a very high standard and hopefully they will continue to flourish. What we must really hope for, however, is that Metacomco have proved to the Americans that big is not necessarily best. In winning this contract over the likes of Microsoft and Digital Research it has proved that Britain can keep up with the rest of the world when it comes to get up and go!

Amiga DOS has already been accepted by many major software houses and they have agreed to provide many important packages for the Amiga, which is a truly superb computer. FKJ

The forthcoming **Amiga will have** substantial advantages to offer users; not least the outstandingly flexible Metacomco-written operating system which incorporates multi-tasking and has already aroused notable interest. The illustration shows an example of how the multi-tasking facility may be used.

Get Organised

For the businessman who really does have everything, the Psion Organiser represents another chance to open his chequebook! Seriously, what the Organiser does show is how small computers can really get, and how the future of computing might develop.

The Organiser is roughly the same size as a Sony Walkman, and is truly pocketsize. When opened and turned on it displays the time and date and then gives you a series of alternatives as to what to do next.

Running Programs

To run programs you must turn off the computer and then plug an eprom-sized cartridge into the rear of the Organiser. These can be any of the packages Psion make, including utilities, communications packages, and basic text editing.

The Organiser is a very neatly put together package, the screen is clear and adjustable (although it is only one line and therefore impractical for real use), and the keyboard is no worse than a calculator.



The most impressive function of the Organiser is as a Communication device. Using the Comms pack and cable, you are able to plug it into any RS232 or RS432 socket and load data either from a host computer or, theoretically, from an on-line computer via a telephone link and modem. Included in the manual is a basic program to transmit data to and from a PC and without too much difficulty this can be extended to transmit Wordstar compatible text files.

The real failing of the Organiser is the same as its advantage, size. Although it is the most truly portable computer on the market, it is too small to be of any real use. The lack of a qwerty keyboard is also an important oversight as, even if it were very small it is what everyone is used to.

On the move

If you really need a portable computer on which you can type in documents whilst on the move and then load and edit at home, don't buy the Psion. If, however, you are looking for a glorified calculator which, if pushed, can act as terminal or text editor then look no further. Price £99.95.




