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Amiga 1200 IDE to Compact Flash Conversion by Chuck Kern

The Commodore Amiga A1200 ships stock with a 2.5", 44-pin IDE HD, the same type commonly found in modern laptop computers.

One thing that many people are not aware of is that the Compact Flash (CF) connector is pinout compatible with the IDE connector. This makes it a trivial matter to adapt any IDE system to use CF in place of conventional hard drives.

For those of you unfamiliar with the terminology, CF cards are common in digital cameras, and can be purchased in sizes up to 4GB with a price that is similar to HD pricing.

Users of the IDE64 may note that it has been common for several years among IDE64 users to use CF to IDE adapters on their IDE64 cards. If you were at the 2004 SWRAP expo, you may have noticed Greg Nacu using such a setup.

In the past, CF to IDE adapters were not very common, somewhat of an obscure item, and as such were expensive.

I'd seen Compact Flash to IDE adapters on eBay.com for some time, but recently the price has plummeted, and I finally found one for the low price of \$1.00! (buy it now option), with \$6.99 shipping.

Since the total cost was roughly \$8, and I happened to have a 128MB Compact Flash card just laying around, I had to try this hack.

It took a week for the IDE to CF adapter to arrive, as it was shipped from a vendor in the UK.

Installing the CF to IDE adapter is a simple matter:

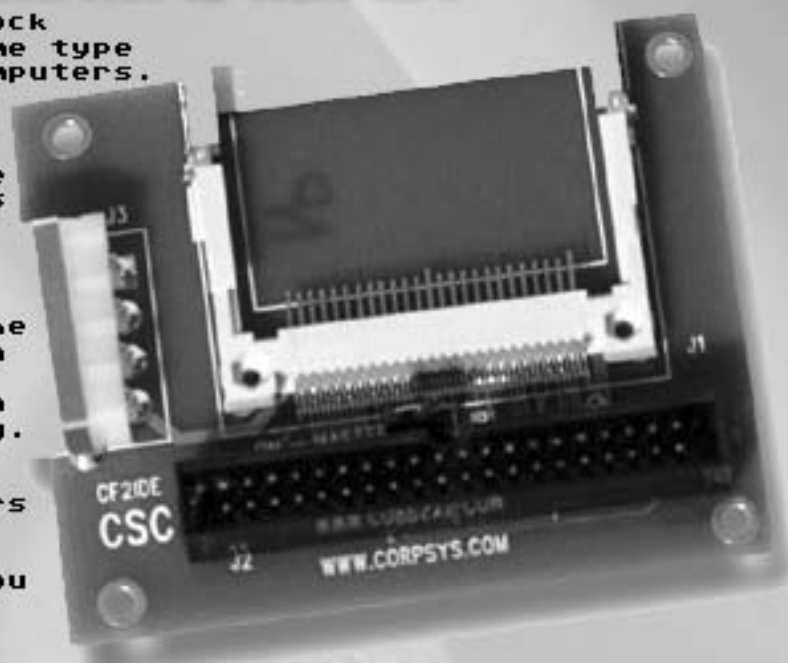
1. Open the Amiga (Warning, this voids your warranty.)
2. Remove the existing 2.5" IDE HD.
3. Install a CF card in the IDE to CF adapter.
4. Install the IDE to CF adapter in it's place.
5. Wrap the IDE to CF adapter assembly in some sort of plastic to avoid shorts. (I used clear packing tape.)
6. Close the Amiga
7. Use HD Toolbox to format the CF card.
8. Install an OS (I use Scalos)

There are many benefits to this hack, a few of which are:

1. Cheaper media. 2.5" IDE HDs are expensive.
2. Reduced heat. The CF card puts out almost no heat, especially in comparison to an HD. Users of accellerator cards should especially appreciate this benefit.
3. Reduced power consumption. If you have a few add-ons, this should help alleviate any power load issues you have.
4. Smaller "footprint". - The entire IDE to CF assembly, card included, takes up less space than the original 2.5" IDE HD.

Once the installation was complete, the CF card came right up in HDTools, just as if it was a conventional HD. I used a 128MB CF card, making two 56 MB partitions. The system now boots from poweron to the workbench screen in less than 5 seconds.

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4C Club BBS News, By Chuck Kern



The 4C Club BBS has been in the testing stages for roughly a month. One of the issues that has slowed down deployment has been the unfortunate fact that C-Net Amiga is no longer available for purchase. It appears that the person who bought the rights to the software is not going to honor the original support agreements, support or sell the Amiga version and is instead going to focus on the PC version.

Fortunately for us, C-Net Amiga 3.05 is still available online. Initially, the board was going to be 3-nodes, using Six's (Oliver VieBrooks) Amiga 2000 and a multi-serial adapter. After some investigation, however, we discovered that it would be possible to use telnetd.device and the A1200 with an ethernet card to run as many nodes as we wanted.

The BBS will be available via telnet at this URL:
telnet://cincy.ath.cx

The possibility of adding a dialup line for our modem-only users will be discussed at the November meeting.

If anyone in the club needs help getting onto the BBS, Six has volunteered his time and expertise.

Currently there are 4 nodes running, more will be added if traffic becomes an issue. There are some internodal features, such as chat rooms, and internodal messaging.

The ever-popular BBS game "Empire" is up and running. There are literally thousands of PFiles available for C-Net, but many of them are of limited appeal. If anyone would like to request a game, I will try to get it online.

Please suggest more if there is something you want that you don't see.

There is a text file (GFiles) area available, and there has been some discussion of mirroring the club's sales lists there.

Up/Download bases will be limited to demos, magazine disks, and useful utilities that can be difficult to find online in other places. We are not running a warez BBS, so if it's ADFs of games you're looking for, talk to Six.

We will be needing subops for each of the areas. Please contact me in feedback on the BBS if you are interested in helping out.

Also, we are looking for ANSI and Commodore C/G artists to draw welcome screens, sub-op entry screens, exit screens and other graphics as needed.

The BBS will be open to the general public, and will have special access for all of the club members. Hopefully this will serve as a gathering place for many of our members who don't have the ability to get on IRC or attend the meetings, but do have a modem and terminal for their Commodore system.

Location:

The World of Commodore Expo will be held at the Alderwood United Church, located at 44 Delma Drive (click for map) which is south of Sherway Gardens and west of Browns Line. Exit the QEW or southbound 427 to Evans Avenue, turn south at the lights onto Gair Drive and follow Gair to Delma Drive. The church is a twenty minute drive (approximately) from Pearson International Airport or downtown Toronto.

The World of Commodore is also easily accessible by public transit. The TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) offers rapid and reliable service. Take the 123 Shorncliffe South bus which departs the Kipling subway station every twenty minutes (check the TTC's schedule for up-to-date information) and can drop you off on Evans at Gair.
