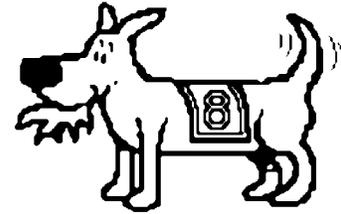


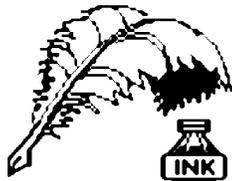

Don's Digest

Try as we might, oft we find our efforts for perfection all too often fall short. Such is the case with the September 1994 Disk O'Quarter. After giving

advance copies to the steering committee one problem was quickly spotted and fixed. The only ones to have that problem are steering committee members and about half of them were taken care of at the September meeting. If you got an advance copy and didn't get it replaced come see me. Also, There was a problem with the menu and Disk Whiz 128. The directory shows the "D" either as an upper case character or as a "-". The menu program dropped this first character and thus the program won't load from the menu. You have 3 major options:

First option, load the menu program and list line 1055. Now add the letter "D" to the name "ISK WHIZ.128". The entire title must be in the same case. Now type

```
RUN 55555
```

and press RETURN. Next list the directory and change the name there from "-ISK WHIZ.128" to "DISK WHIZ.128". On the 128 simply type

```
RENAME"-ISK WHIZ.128" TO "DISK WHIZ.128"
```

and press RETURN. On the 64 it's a bit more complex. Start by opening a command channel by typing

```
OPEN15,8,15  
PRINT#15,"RENAME:-ISK WHIZ.128=DISK WHIZ.128"  
PRINT#15:CLOSE15
```

Remember to press RETURN at the end of each line.

Second option, Just load that file through the directory.

Third option, Bring your disk to me and I'll fix it for you. I did fix some at the club meeting. If you don't know if yours is good, just bring in your disk and we'll check it.

I also want to apologize for the lack of color in the slide show pictures this time. You see, I put all my slide show pictures on a 1581 disk and viewed them on my SX-64. When I put the DOQ together, I checked which was the last one used and went from there. I checked the pictures this time on my 128 with a

monochrome monitor. At this point I didn't realize they were almost entirely black and white.

All in all I still believe the DOQ #6 is a great issue. It contains: *Omega Race*, *Math Dungeon*, *Digger*, *Video Titler* (by our own Dale Lutes), and several things for the GEOS user.

Remember the DOQ is free to regular members. 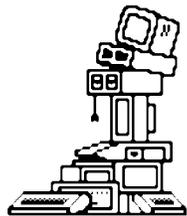

CUW's First Year: Eight Bits at a Time

"A NEW CLUB IS BORN - On Friday, October 8, 1993 twenty users of the C64 and C128 met and formed a new club, The Commodore Users of Wichita."

Those proud words were written by Fred Earley and appeared on the front page of the first issue of our (then unnamed) club newsletter. It seems appropriate that this month's meeting falls exactly on October 8. We've had a lot of fun times (and a few trying ones) in the last twelve months. In place of my regular *Random Access* column, I thought we'd take a stroll down memory lane together.

October - Members of the C&AUGW's 8-bit SIG have become disenchanted with the direction that club is taking. They decide to chart their own course and form the CUW. With no money and no meeting place, they find a home at the Wichita Water Department and hold *two* meetings that month.

November - Issue #1 of the newsletter announces the first regular club meeting which is attended by 31 people. Membership fees are a hot topic during the business meeting!

December - Fred Earley demonstrates *Perfect Print* and "shakes up" Jerry Shook with some custom business cards. The first CUW edition of the Disk O'Quarter is released and paid memberships are recognized for the first time.

January - The newsletter now has three semi-regular columns (that continue to this day): *Don's Digest*, *Random Access*, and the newest *Jerry's Corner*. Jerry Shook demonstrates *Flex File*.

February - This is a good news/bad news month. The club loses its original home at the Water Dept and moves to its present South Oliver location. The CUW and C&AUGW are reconciled at last! Ownership of the 8-bit hardware is officially transferred to the new club. The newsletter gets a new name, *The Zero Page*, and Eight-Bit takes up residence on the cover.

March - This month sees one of our best meetings with Don McManamey's color printing demo. Disk O'Quarter #4 is released and elections are the main topic during the business meeting.

April - Telecommunications is the featured topic. Robert Bales overcomes telephone difficulties to give us a guided tour of the Sherer 'N Place BBS. Nominations are opened for the offices of Chair and Vice-Chair.

May - 31 members skip the River Festival bathtub races to cast ballots in the first-ever CUW election. Dale Lutes and Marie Both win the offices of Chair and Vice-Chair. The Koala Pad is the subject of our feature demonstration.

June - The membership approves the appointment of Robert Bales, Francis Catudal, Nate Dannenberg, Arlen Gould, Don McManamey, and Jerry Shook to the steering committee. Jerry Shook follows up his *Flex File* demonstration with a hands-on clinic.

July - Dale Lutes presents an introduction to GEOS. The club makes a special large quantity purchase of 5-1/4 inch disks, passing the savings on to the members.

August - GEOS is once again the featured meeting topic. The first draft of the club bylaws is presented and discussed during the business meeting.

September - The final draft of the bylaws is officially adopted! The club receives an equipment donation that includes three C-128 systems. Jerry Shook and Kaycie Roush present the first in a series of *Write Stuff* demonstrations.

We moved the demo to the back room so that other members' activities would not interrupt the presentation, and that room was quickly filled to capacity. We will be revisiting *The Write Stuff* again in October. Remember that the club is an authorized distributor and can offer the Busy Bee family of software at a super discount to CUW members.

Bylaws of the Commodore Users of Wichita

"For the sharing, learning, and love of Commodore computers"

Purpose of Commodore Users of Wichita Club:

The purpose of our Commodore club is to supply fellowship, education & support for all Commodore 8-bit computer users. □We feel the best way to do this is to restrict membership to those people who have an interest in the Commodore 8-bit machines. Our main□focus will be on the C= 64 and C= 128 as well as what ever help or assistance we can give to the VIC 20, Plus 4, C= 16 & Pet Commodores.

Requirements for Membership:

The most important requirement is a desire to work with one or more of the Commodore 8-bit computers. The annual dues□will be set by the membership. A full member will be entitled to vote on club business, receive a copy of the bylaws, a club monthly□paper, a disk of the quarter, use the club's public domain library, use the club's commercial lending library and have a chance to purchase specials□as well as getting any assistance they may need that the club is able to give.

Associate members are immediate members of a family with a full club membership. An Associate member is entitle to use□both libraries and what services we have to offer, but may not vote. An Associate member will be granted the privilege to vote upon□payment of an additional fee set by the membership.

Limited membership will be granted to anyone willing to pay a newsletter-only fee set by the membership.

Honorary membership may be granted to anyone that has given or is giving a product or extraordinary service to the□club, subject to a simple majority vote of voting members at a regular scheduled meeting.

Nomination & Election Process:

Elections will be held annually beginning in 1994. Nominations open at the start of the March club meeting and close□at the end of the April club meeting. Nominations may be made in person or in writing to the Chair or Vice Chair. Members may nominate themselves.□Nominees are required to submit a position statement for inclusion in the May newsletter prior to the deadline set by the Newsletter□Editor.

Elections will be held at the May meeting. Votes will be cast by secret ballot of the members present. Members that will be absent may vote absentee, but all ballots must be returned to the Chair or Vice-Chair by start of the May meeting. The Chair will appoint two election officers with the approval of the members present.

The election officers will distribute, collect, and count the ballots. The winner will be determined by a simple majority of the votes cast. In the event that no candidate receives a majority, a runoff will be held between the two candidates who receive the most votes. In the event of a tie, the Chair may cast the tie-breaking vote or request that a second ballot be counted. A majority of the members present may request a re-count of the ballots cast.

The new officers will assume their posts on June 1. Term of office will be for 1 year and for no more than 2 consecutive terms in one office. After 1 year out of office or service in a different office the member may again run for the office that he/she held for 2 years.

Elected Officers:

- Chair**
- Is responsible for conducting the monthly CUW meetings
 - Is responsible for setting the meeting agenda
 - Serves as representative of the CUW to outside organizations
 - Makes arrangements for Steering Committees meetings
 - Makes appointments to the Steering Committee
 - May form ad-hoc committees
- Vice Chair**
- Assumes the duties of the Chair in his/her absence
 - Is responsible for maintaining the CUW membership database
 - Is responsible for processing new member applications
 - Is responsible for maintaining the CUW financial records and must be ready to show them upon request.

Appointed Officers:

The Steering Committee is composed of the Chair, Vice Chair, and these appointed officers:

Appointments are made by the Chair and must be approved by a simple majority of the members present at a monthly club meeting.

Removal from Office:

Any member of the Steering Committee may be removed from office by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at a monthly club meeting.

Finances:

Three separate cash boxes will be maintained: Public Domain Library and the Commercial Lending Library will keep no more than \$10 cash each. The General Petty cash fund will not exceed \$25 cash and will be kept by the Vice Chair or their named Assistant. No single fund keeper will spend more than \$50 in any month or exceed \$200 a year. The Steering Committee will not spend more than \$100 over and above normal monthly expenditures without getting permission from a majority of the members in attendance at a regular meeting.

Amending the Bylaws:

A proposed amendment or addition can be presented by any club member in good standing at any regular meeting to be placed in the club paper and voted on at the following meeting, but must have at least two-thirds vote to pass.

Steering Committee Meetings:

All members have the right to attend steering committee meetings, but must notify the Chair of their desire to attend.

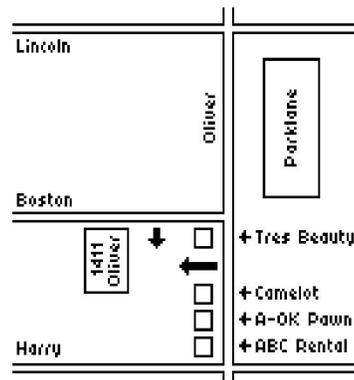
