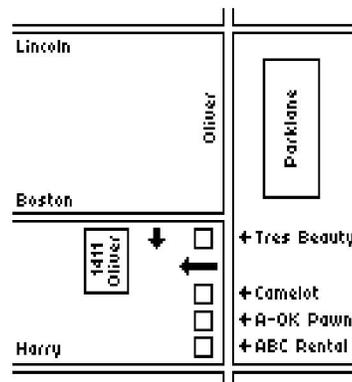
Join Eight-Bit and Tidbit for the next meeting of the GEOS Special Interest Group
