

Review: Home Manager

Program: The Home Manager

Valueware

Computer: C64, C128 in 64 mode

Cost: \$9.95

This package consists of three programs: "The Word Processor", "Data Magic", and "The Calculator and Memo Pad".

The programs are loaded from a menu which is loaded using 'LOAD"*",8' and 'RUN'.

THE WORD PROCESSOR: This program allows the entry of text and the saving or printing of this text. The program does not have many editing or other features but does permit the following: set/change left and right margins; insert lines; delete lines (or parts of lines); set/clear tab stops; full cursor control; and quick advance forward or backward one page.

As a result of the limited entry/editing features, text must be centred manually and all other editing must also be done manually (cut and paste, search and replace, etc.).

Printing the document gives a few more options — six options, in fact, can be selected. 1. The secondary address for the printer can be selected. The initial value given is 7 (lower case on Commodore printers) but this can be changed to a number of different possibilities. Choices 2 — 4 allow the selections: Number Pages?, Justify Text? and Double Space?. Each of these add to the flexibility of the program. Option 5 asks if you want Sheet Feed? This is for printers that do not have continuous feed sprockets. The last option is for Normal Ascii? This option allows for the use of non-Commodore printers.

To print a document using a Gemini printer with a Cardco +G interface I had to set the interface to TRANSPARENT MODE (OPEN 25,4,25:PRINT#25:CLOSE25) before loading the program. Then I selected 0 for a secondary address and Y for Normal Ascii and the printout worked perfectly. The program disk contains a 3 1/2 page instruction file which can be loaded and then printed. Most of the description in the manual is involved in accomplishing this. The program also contains a help screen which summarizes the use of the special keys involved in the program.

DATA MAGIC is a simple file handler program. It permits creating and using a file which contains as many records as the disk can hold. Each record can have up to 8 fields with each field having a set length of 30 characters.

Some special features this program has are: VIEW/EDIT records (accessed by record number) and SEARCH for specified data. Data found using SEARCH can be edited as soon as it appears on the screen. DATA MAGIC only allows the printing of $\underline{\text{all}}$ the data for a record which is a major drawback to $\underline{\text{this}}$ program.

The CALCULATOR AND MEMO PAD is the third program on this disk. Each of these desktop features can coexist with normal BASIC. They produce a window which will display a calculator or memo screen when the key combination C=* or SHIFT * is pressed and will disappear by pressing LEFT ARROW.

The CALCULATOR works like a normal calculator with the added features of memory and memory recall. The MEMO PAD allows you to write and save memos. A special feature allows you to "find" an item in the memo. Through the memo pad you can also get a non-destructive disk catalog which allows you to view your disk directory without losing your BASIC program. A memo file called "IDEAS" can be loaded to give you some ideas for uses for the memo pad.

To print the contents of a memo file you must turn the computer off and then on and load a program called "PRINTMEMO".

Overall, the word processing program and the file handler are too simple and restrictive for all but the most simple uses. The calculator and memo pad features, particularily because they can be accessed while using BASIC, are useful and probably worth the price of the disk.

Review: Pclip Publisher

PAPERCLIP PUBLISHER: The newest in a long line of inexpensive desktop publishing packages, and possibly one of the best to date! PAPERCLIP PUBLISHER is distributed by the BATTERIES INCLUDED division of ELECTRONIC ARTS.

PUBLISHER allows very sophisticated formatting of word processor text into template-like overlays designed by YOU! The PUBLISHER actually contains a limited word processor (more correctly a text editor) for editing text, a graphics editor for importing and editing a variety of graphics. Although you can use other sources, the package you purchase contains sample graphic art and several fonts for use in preparing your documents.

PRO:-The package is "self-contained" and will stand alone as a publishing package.

- -The program is reasonably inexpensive (around \$60.00 Canadian).
- -It allows the mixing of several fonts on a single page.
- -The program allows the mixing of artwork and text, and the RESIZING of both in a document.
- -It allows 13 styles of an selected font, including OUTLINE, BACK SLANT, SUPER and SUBSCRIPT!
- -It allows easy multi-page setup and editing.
- -Print quality is EXCELLENT! (even on my beat-up 6 year ol' Gemini 10X
- -It permits the OVERLAYING of text and graphics in a single document.
- -PUBLISHER allows the importing of both text and graphics from other programs (PAPERCLIP, ASCII word processors, GEOS, NEWSROOM, PRINTMASTER, DOODLE, PRINT SHOP)
- -Fonts from GEOS may be converted to serve as PUBLISHER fonts.
- -Entirely menu driven.
- -NOT COPY PROTECTED
- -supports keyboard, joystick, tablet or mouse
- -several common dot-matrix printer files
 included.
- CON:-Menus load smaller program overlays and take a little time moving from function to function.
 - -Main display shows "large page" overview, with no detailed text readable. Even the GeoWrite editor, slow as it is, is better than this vague image IF YOU FEEL YOU NEED LAST-MINUTE EDITING.
 - -Some of the icons are a little confusing to new users. Everywhere you look, there's a new icon!
 - -Disk access is generally SLOW no quick-load improvements here!

-You use the original disk to create "work disks" with your required fonts and graphics on that disk - not very convenient!

-Although the instruction book is well-written and the tutorial is well done, it is not a very good REFERENCE book to search out necessary bits of information! For example, the technique for using other fonts appears long after the methods for printing ... one might, as I did, find that you had to quit the program to do some kind of preparation in order to properly continue>

-Certain functions MUST be done with a joystick or mouse. I don't own a mouse, but the joystick sensitivity was troublesome. Alternative keyboard controls might have improved accuracy for positioning and sizing.

-Although there is a MAGNIFY utility, until a document is printed there is no way to accurately see how actual text or graphics are formatted.

All in all, the package offers a good (not great), very good set of utilities to create interesting and attractive newsletters, simple newsletters, posters and the like!

If you'd like to dabble in newslettering, and you're not fond of Newroom's disk swapping, or GEOS's slow and cumbersome screen editing, and something to take advantage of other programs you already use, like PRINTMASTER or PRINT SHOP, PUBLISHER is an excellent all-in-one purchase. On a scale of 1 to 10, an 8. The ad for next month's meeting was created with PUBLISHER, just for the sake of example.

128 Windows:

No programs this month. Instead, I thought I'd mention some of the neat extras all the C64 owners might envy of the C and D128 owners. By now, everyone knows that the 128's natural operating mode is BASIC 7.0. Simply put, BASIC 7.0 provides BASIC commands for most of the inconveniences of BASIC 2.0 (C64). Former PET owners will recognize most of the new commands, but there are several new many for manipulating sound and graphics that have a logic every C64 owner will understand. Less touted are the vastly improved DISK ACCESS COMMANDS available to the lucky 128 owner!

To review, first, both C64 and 128 owners can OPEN, CLOSE, use the CMD channel, GET#, PRINT#, LOAD and SAVE. Both can also VERIFY, RENAME, CONCAT and format disks using "old" VERSION 2 BASIC commands. There the two BASICs part company, and BASIC 7.0 far outshines any previous. A short summary of the available additional commands is listed here. Remember that, in addition to these added conveniences, 128 owners get true double-sided disk access allowing double the disk capacity (without physically flipping the disk), and access to something called "BURST MODE" (more on that another time.

APPEND - add data to the end of a file.

BLOAD/BSAVE - load/save ML data directly from BASIC CATALOG/DIRECTORY - non-destructive disk directory.

COPY - copy files between devices.
DLOAD/DSAVE - disk default for loading and saving.
DOPEN, DVERIFY, DCLEAR, DCLOSE - default to disk

commands.

COLLECT - default to disk VERIFY.


BOOT - load and run a bootable program.

RUN - load and run a BASIC program.

HEADER - default to disk, FORMATTING command.

And to finish, to REALLY impress any C64 owner who's ever tried to construct an effective Relative file - RECORD - a command to position the pointers in a RELATIVE FILES!

Scratch 'n' Save

A few months after receiving my C64, back in 1982, I managed to pick up a copy of the EASYSCRIPT word processor which I used until a few months ago. At that time I purchased a used copy of PAPERCLIP. Today, for the first time, I am writing this column on POCKET WRITER 2 without reading much out of its reference guide. I am not having any problems doing so as the program is menu driven via HELP files and the reference guide is documented well.

The feature that strikes me the most is its 80 col. format in the C128 mode. You see on your screen exactly how your article will appear in hard copy. No visible carriage returns. No annoying margin set controls. Your text enhancements become screened just the way you selected them instead of words bordered in control codes. This I really like.

But there are a few things I miss from my earlier choices. EASYSCRIPT allowed me to choose my screen line lengths past the 80 character limit of POCKET WRITER 2 (e.g. 240 which I used a lot in condensed print). you, you did have to pan across the monitor screen but at least the option was available to you. Another nice feature of EASYSCRIPT was the ability to load as many disk directories as you liked into your processing without losing anything, and without saving them as individual files. PAPERCLIP hasn't these options either but PAPERCLIP does allow you to save your files in a sequential format if you so desire. EASYSCRIPT loads sequential format if you so desire. and saves sequential files only. PAPERCLIP loads and saves any program or sequential files (Commodore ASCII) and POCKET WRITER 2 saves program files only, but does allow you to load any kind of a file including true ASCII files (handy if you obtain these kind of files from bulletin boards).

Ten new disk listings (3 of them 128) for our library are included elsewhere in THE MONITOR.

And finally, I forget to mention each month that the library has in its possession two books which members may borrow (in one month stretches) from the library.

- 1. THE COMAL HANDBOOK A 310 page handbook on how to use the COMAL language to your best advantage. We have COMAL program disks in our library.
- 2. THE BEST OF TORPET/MORE FOR THE COMMODORE 64 AND THE VIC-20 - This book covers many aspects of the $64\ \mathrm{and}$ Vic-20 and consists of a disk with several useful programs on it.
