

#### From the Editor's Desk



The C128's 88-col display IC, known as the Video Display Chip (VDC), has it's own RAM on the computer's motherboard. The original C128 came with 16K of VDC RAM, while the newer C128D has 64K of VDC RAM. You don't exactly POP the new ram into your C-128; you see, Commodore in their ultimate wisdom socketed just about everything in the C-128, except the 16k VDC consisting of 2 4416 chips. If you are a C-128 use,r and you wish to upgrade, there are 2 methods:

The first is to DESOLDER you 4416's and resolder in 2 4464's. Dunno about you, but I am hesitant to do this myself. I believe you can get a dealer to do the work, but they will charge you an arm and a leg. The chips cost maybe 5–7\$ for both.

The second is a much easier way. SSI, among other companies, sell daughterboards with the 64k VDC RAM in them. What you do is remove your 8563, which is socketed, pop this little board into the socket, and there is a socket on the daughter board to put your 8563 back into. I believe these sell for around \$50. And bingo you have 64k VDC RAM! Just like the C128D.

Every month it will be my pleasure to choose the best files from the new disks for that month and place them on a special disk to be called the Disk-of-the-Month. It will be offered for sale that month only, so you must be present at the general meeting to purchase this disk. It will be offered for the same amount as any other disk.

Also, this article is to be the spot where I discuss this disk's contents. And to that endeavor . . , this month features GRAPHICS!

Super Stideshow - This superbly done slideshow/graphics viewer program comes to us courtesy of COMPUTE! Gazette. It will display graphics pictures from any of a number of popular formats. To run the demo slideshow, load and run the program "slideshow player", then flip the disk over and enter "sshow data" for the script filename. It will display five KoalaPaint and five Doodle! pictures and give you additional information about the graphic formats it supports.

ps.image.viewer – Ken Danylczuk graciously provided this program to be placed on the DOM this month. It will display 2-block Print Shop graphics to the screen. List the beginning of the main program (which is written in BASIC) to obtain information on how to format a sequential file for the program to setup its menu. A sample sequential file and five Print Shop graphics have been provided, however, remember to turn the disk over before attempting to view a selection from the menu.

Giffy — when CompuServe came up with their GIF (pronounced "jif") format they must have known what they were doing. This is the latest version of the GIF viewer for the C64 and is considered by many, and rightly so, to be a programming marvel. Find included on the second side on the DOM three GIF pictures for you to view.

Gif128 - this is the 128 version of giffy.

REU Programs – included for those who own RAM Expansion Units (REUs) are a KoalaPaint slideshow program and another version of giffy both for use with the REU!

Piocet Packer — This conversion program will convert graphic pictures from several different formats to either normal or compressed Doodle! or KoalaPaint formats. This also was donated by Ken Danylozuk.

Chameteon – The conversion program to end all conversion programs! If this program doesn't convert to and from the format of your graphics program it probably isn't worth converting! Again donated by Ken Danylozuk.

Laser Chess - Won first prize in COMPUTE's Atari ST Disk & Magazine contest. It's a two-player strategy game patterned after traditional chess -- with some fascinating new twists! This is a real thinkers game! AWESOME!!!!

Tetris-sø = 80-column tetris for the 128. Barry says it's highly addictive!

Note that all the graphics for the graphics programs are on the flip side of the disk! Remember to turn the disk over before viewing the graphics! Have fun!

There are four new C64 disks this month: Education 3, Graphic Games 1, and Graphics 2 & 3. All those and the DOM, too! Holy Software, Batpeople! That's GREAT!!!
